When I arrived in Melbourne this car was not operating in Victoria, and now we have 24 vehicles across the state. Thank you to Kanno-san for always accepting my requests to bring new people to test-drive these vehicles! He has never said no!

I am grateful to have seen so much progress in the HESC project. It was a very memorable day when I went to the Port of Hastings for the arrival of the Suiso Frontier in 2022. I hope for this project's continued success and a further scaling up of the hydrogen industry.

My only regret during my time here is that we were not able to make an official sumo tournament happen. I will keep advocating for this and I hope that someday we will see them here. If that happens, I will have to come back!

On the Australian side, I want to give my thanks to the Australia-Japan Business Council of Victoria. You have a fantastic network here and it has been my pleasure to work with you all. The Gala Dinner was a highlight for Kaoru and I every year and I'm glad we were able to attend last week's event before our departure. This Gala really encapsulates the spirit of the Victoria-Japan relationship.

As Consul-General, it is delightful to see so much support for Japan amongst the younger generation. I hope for the continued success of JET and for it to lead to wonderful career opportunities for the next generation.

There is a wonderful harmony between career and honorary consuls here in Melbourne. While the career consuls come and go, with new faces every few years, the network of honorary consuls ensure stability and continuity for our international partnerships.
